#### CANTON COMMUNITY PRESERVATION PLAN

#### Canton Community Preservation Act Survey

#### Overview

The purpose of the Canton Community Preservation Act Survey was primarily to solicit community members' perspectives on overall priorities for CPA funding and on specific priorities around housing, open space, and historic preservation in the town. This survey is not intended to be a scientifically significant poll, rather it is a way to reach more people in the community than can be reached through public forums. Nine hundred and eighty three people participated in the survey. The survey was active for about two and a half months from early February until mid April 2022. Full responses to all survey questions can be found in the Appendix.

#### **Key Findings**

- Survey respondents were more likely to be female and had higher incomes then the town's population overall but were similar in age breakdown to the town's population.
- Respondents were moderate users of parks, playgrounds, or athletic fields in Canton.
- When asked which types of outdoor recreation projects in Canton are the most important, two categories of projects scored the most highly projects related to walking and biking including creating new trails, and improvements and updates to existing parks, playgrounds, and athletic fields.
- When asked about their main concerns about housing issues in Canton, most respondents showed concern that existing residents and adult children raised in Canton will not be able to buy a home due to rising prices.
- The most pressing housing issues for respondents were housing affordability for seniors and veterans, affordable housing for low and middle income households, and maintenance and upgrades to existing housing in Canton.
- When asked what types of historic preservation projects are the most important, protecting historic resources threatened by new development scored the most highly
- When asked about specific project ideas, a number of residents specifically noted that they would like to see more done at the Paul Revere Heritage Site, such as a museum. In addition to this, many respondents expressed a desire to find a project that honors the area's Native American history.
- About 40 percent of respondents indicated that they visit protected natural areas 1-2 times a month, and 26 percent never visit them.
- Priorities for open space in Canton include acquisition or protection of undeveloped land for the purpose of mitigating the impacts of climate change and for open space conservation that provides public access, according to respondents
- In order of priority, respondents would like to see CPA funding spent on Active Recreation, Open Space & Passive Recreation, Historic Preservation, and Community Housing.

#### Demographics of Survey Respondents

The following summarizes how the demographic and housing characteristics of survey respondents compare with the characteristics of Canton's population overall, per the 2020 ACS five year estimates.

- Nearly all live in Canton (94 percent), with 2 percent who work in Canton and live elsewhere, and the remaining 4 percent with other connections to Canton.
- Most respondents identified as Female (66 percent, while 34 percent identified as Male)
- Similar in age breakdown to Town population over 18, with more respondents between the age of 35 and 54 than the town as a whole, and fewer respondents between 18 and 34 than the town as a whole. Sixty-one percent of respondents have children under age 18
- More likely to be higher-income earners (see table below for details)

#### **Survey Topics**

Overall, most respondents indicated some familiarity with the Community Preservation Act. About 40 percent of respondents indicated they were "somewhat familiar." About 18 percent were "very familiar" or "extremely familiar," and 33 percent were "not so familiar" or "not at all familiar."

#### Active Recreation

## Overall, respondents were moderate users of parks, playgrounds, and athletic fields in Canton, with about 50 percent of respondents saying they visit between one and seven times per month.

About 20 percent of respondents indicated that they never use any of these facilities, and 25 percent indicated that they use them 1-2 times per month. About a quarter of respondents use them 3-7 times per month, and over 30 percent of respondents indicated using the town's parks, playgrounds, or athletic fields more than 8 times per month (twice a week or more).

# When asked which types of outdoor recreation projects in Canton are the most important, two categories of projects scored the most highly – projects related to walking and biking including creating new trails, and improvements and updates to existing parks, playgrounds, and athletic fields.

Nearly 85 percent of respondents indicated that creating bike trails and/or walking paths was somewhat or very important. On the other hand, the addition of more parks, dog parks, playgrounds, and athletic fields scored significantly lower. The addition of more parks and playgrounds produced the most "neutral" responses of any categories, along with the creation of new skateboard parks and

dog parks. Nearly 25 percent of respondents said that creating new dog parks was not at all important, and over 30 percent indicated that creating new skateboard parks was not important at all.

#### Community Housing

## When asked about their main concerns about housing issues in Canton, most respondents showed concern that existing residents and adult children raised in Canton will not be able to buy a home due to rising prices.

Respondents were less concerned about the character of Canton changing due to housing costs or people moving out due to rising rents. The table below shows detailed responses to the survey question about housing concerns:

When asked **"Are there any specific community housing projects/programs that you would like to see considered for CPA funding in the upcoming years?"**, responses were primarily focused on senior housing and affordable housing:

- Senior and Veteran Housing: Many respondents would like to see affordable housing options for seniors to live independently. Several respondents mentioned housing for veterans as well. Overall, affordable housing for seniors was one of the most common ideas given in answer to this question.

- **Affordable Housing:** While some respondents indicated that there is already enough affordable housing in Canton, others indicated a need for more affordable units for low and middle income households.
- **Maintenance**: Many respondents indicated a need for improving and maintaining existing housing, like Hagen and Rubin Court.
- **Other**: Other responses included concerns of overdevelopment and a need for proper planning before adding new housing, particularly when considering the impact that new housing has on the local school system and traffic.

#### Historic Preservation

## When asked what types of historic preservation projects are the most important, protecting historic resources threatened by new development scored the most highly (46 percent selected "very important")

Respondents also indicated that preserving or restoring Canton's historic artifacts and documents, preserving or restoring historic properties that are open to the public, and improving handicapped access to historic resources are all very important (each response had 30 percent of respondents mark it as "very important".

When asked "Are there any specific historic preservation projects that you would like to see considered for CPA funding in the upcoming years?", a number of residents specifically noted that they would like to see more done at the Paul Revere Heritage Site, such as a museum. In addition to this, many respondents expressed a desire to find a project that honors the area's Native American history.

Other historic preservation location and project ideas include Memorial Hall, the local cemeteries, signs around town showing historic assets and places around town, Town Hall, and the Gridley School.

#### **Open Space & Passive Recreation**

Respondents were asked how many times a month they visit protected natural areas in Canton like the Paul Revere Heritage Site or the Earl Newhouse Waterfront.

### About 40 percent of respondents indicated that they visit protected natural areas 1-2 times a month, and 26 percent never visit them.

Twenty percent visit these areas 3-7 times a month and the remaining 14 percent visit them more than 8 times per month.


When asked about specific types of open space and passive recreation projects in Canton, respondents rated the acquisition or protection of undeveloped land for the purpose of mitigating the impacts of climate change and for open space conservation that provides public access most highly.

About ten percent of respondents indicated that the acquisition or protection of undeveloped land for the purpose of mitigating the impacts of climate change was not important. Over 40 percent of respondents indicated that the creation of new walking paths or hiking trails in general and those that connect existing open space areas were very important. About 40 percent of respondents also indicated that creating handicap access to open space was very important.

When asked about specific open space or passive recreation project ideas, many people mentioned specific locations and connections for walking, hiking, and biking trails, like the reservoir, Bolivar Pond, and more.

#### **Funding Priorities**

When asked to rate their priorities for the CPA funding categories, Active Recreation scored the highest, followed by Open Space and Passive Recreation, Historic Preservation, and finally Community Housing. A breakdown of responses is shown below:


